Trip Diary

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Danube Delta & Black Sea

Limosa's autumn tour to Romania focuses on the magic of migration through this region of the Black Sea. Here we were to combine a wonderful selection of eastern European birds with migrants from the north, whilst enjoying a relaxing break along the Black Sea coast and Danube Delta. It was possible to watch roadside birds including such delights as Roller and Bee-eater, together with some of the scarcer and highly sought after European breeders including Levant Sparrowhawk, Great Black-headed Gull and Lesser Spotted Eagle. Migrant shorebirds included small groups of Broad-billed and Marsh Sandpipers. Our time on the ponton was spent visiting lakes where Whiskered and Black Terns, Pygmy Cormorants, Great White and Dalmatian Pelicans, Great Egrets, Squacco, Purple and Night Herons dominated the scene. We also enjoyed Thrush Nightingale, Isabelline and Pied Wheatears, Paddyfield and Savi's Warblers and plentiful Hawfinches.

The drive from Bucharest (Bucureşti) to the coast boasted an exotic list of birds: Red-footed Falcons, Rollers, a gang of grounded Black Storks and several White Storks, but as these were seen from our bus while driving along the motorway views were not exactly satisfactory. Luckily we caught up with all the species during in the tour. During the drive back we timed a stop at a service station just as seven Lesser Spotted Eagles and a Long-legged Buzzard drifted over.

Sinoe

Short early morning walks at Sinoe produced a very close and completely out in the open Thrush Nightingale, it walked along a low garden wall and back again before plopping into one of the many lush gardens. Also there were a clutch of Red-breasted Flycatchers, a couple of Golden Orioles, several Beeeaters, Red-backed Shrikes, Tree Sparrows and a Little Owl.

Wolves Peninsular

This site is famous for breeding Paddyfield Warblers and we were in luck seeing about five. We were able to compare their plumage details with Reed and Sedge Warblers. One of the lakes was awash with wildfowl, including at least 100 Garganey, three Ferruginous Ducks, Red-crested Pochard, our first Squacco Heron, several Purple Herons, Glossy Ibis, very close Whiskered Terns and a Dalmatian Pelican. An immature male Pallid Harrier flew past followed by another juvenile 'ring-tail' harrier, which from photos was later confirmed as another Pallid. A couple of Montagu's Harriers and a few Gull-billed Terns were hunting the surrounding fields. A straw-coloured Mediterranean Slant-faced Grasshopper was marvelled at.

At a dried-up lake there was a roosting flock of gulls. These weren't just any old gulls but a spectacular gathering of 87 Great Black-headed Gulls mixed in with Caspian Gulls plus Caspian and Common Terns. We got closer to enjoy fabulous views of the largest flock our local guide Zoli had ever seen in Romania. As we boarded the bus another Pallid Harrier sailed by, this time it was a ghostly adult male – lovely! In a small pool in the reeds we discovered a first-winter Citrine Wagtail and enjoyed watching a low-perched Roller. As we left, a couple of flocks of White Pelicans flapped very low past the bus as they battled into strong headwinds. Wow what a morning!

Sitorman Quarry

A Little Owl in a burrow distracted some of us from the main prize, a male and female Pied Wheatear, which were on the other side of the track, plus an Isabelline Wheatear. Well they were surprisingly easy to locate. A short stroll up the hill produced two more Pied Wheatears.

Histria area

Near the village of Nuntaşi we found our first Lesser Grey Shrike of the tour followed by bizarrely another male Pied Wheatear, presumably a migrant. A flock of 100 or so Ruff in a field were following the plough. An all too quick, low flying Saker sped over the road and carried on going, but three hunting Red-footed Falcons hovering right by the road and a Black Stork gave much better views. Two Ospreys resting in a field looked a bit out of place. On a second visit to the archaeological site a pale-morph juvenile Honey Buzzard circled over. In the trees were a couple of Lesser Whitethroat, Red-breasted Flycatcher and Redstart. Nearby having located two showy Stone-curlews we found a Great Reed Warbler and all too brief Wood Warbler.

Năvodari

We spent an enjoyable hour or so scanning the birds either side of the road. Some of the more interesting finds were four Red-necked Grebes, many Black-necked Grebes, Ferruginous Duck, Red-crested Pochard, a Little Bittern that flew out of the reeds for all to see, plus many Black and Whiskered Terns. At a saline pool we came across a really close bright juvenile Broad-billed Sandpiper. Also close were 200 roosting Little Gulls and a Black Tern. On the beach we compared the differences between Caspian Gulls and Yellow-legged Gulls.

Vadu

Before reaching this hot spot for birds we spotted our first Booted Eagle and a Honey-buzzard, followed by a male Levant Sparrowhawk, the only one of the tour! A Dalmatian Pelican flew over with some White Pelicans. On the pools was a beautiful Marsh Sandpiper a Red-necked Phalarope, a few Temminck's Stints and several Little Stints - all bathed in lovely afternoon light. Further on were a couple of very close Lesser Grey Shrikes. Three more Black-necked Grebes gave fabulous views. We marvelled at the swarms of Collared Pratincoles (and three Red-footed Falcons) as they skimmed low over the reeds hunting for insects. Nearby we came across a flock of eight Hoopoes and an amazing concentration of 350 Ruddy Shelduck.

Babadag Forest

Amazingly, a Black Woodpecker broke cover and flew over our heads twice. Later a couple of Middle Spotted Woodpeckers popped out. A Lesser Spotted Woodpecker was heard. There was a profusion of Silver-washed Fritillaries including a female of the *valezina* form.

Murighiol to St George (Sfântul Gheorghe)

Once we had climbed aboard the pontoon, heading down the St George's Channel and en route to St George itself, we spotted a White-tailed Eagle, a Night Heron, a couple of Dalmatian Pelicans and numerous Whiskered Terns and Hobbies. We moored opposite the port of St George and in the morning misty light some saw an Icterine Warbler. On the return to Murighiol we spotted in total six White-tailed Eagles.

Sacalin Island and Sacalin Lagoon

Travelling down the Gârla Turcească (the channel to the lake) we had lovely views of perched Lesser Spotted Woodpecker and a Grey-headed Woodpecker. A Little Bittern flew across the channel. As it opened out into the Lake proper we were confronted by a floating mass of Water Chestnut (aka Water Caltrop) that was liberally littered with stalking Squacco Herons. There were a few waders including a Marsh Sandpiper. Later a Dalmatian Pelican flew up and gave us a fabulous low fly past. Photographs showed it had a couple of Water Chestnut nuts stuck to its breast feathers ready to colonise a new area.

Hopping out into the shallow water we waded ashore to the sandy island and walked south for about a mile, birding as we went. It was fantastic with many waders, including at least 18 Broad-billed Sandpipers. Also among the throngs of birds were four Great Black-headed Gulls. A Dalmatian Pelican stood next to a White Pelican for direct comparison. As we tucked into our picnic on the boats we watched three or four White-tailed Eagles sail over.

Channel Tătaru

After a few hundred yards we came across a family party of six Penduline Tits that quietly foraged away in a small bush. A Grass Snake swam across the channel. A short walk produced a Northern Wheatear, two Grey-headed Woodpeckers and a Large Copper. How could we have lost this beauty in the UK?

Lake Erenciuc

Early morning by the entrance to the lake produced a surprise in the form of a Paddyfield Warbler. It must have been a migrant. A party of Long-tailed Tits, with snowy white heads, flitted through.

By the channel to the Lake we spent a quiet time watching many common warblers: Reed, Sedge, Willow, Great Reed, Blackcap and Chiffchaffs all came very close to the boat. There was the near constant soft rattle of the Red-breasted Flycatchers. At the lake two Penduline Tits showed well. There were many Squacco Herons on the floating Water Chestnut. Also there were several Whiskered Terns, two skulking Savi's Warblers, a Dalmatian Pelican that flew about, and a perched White-tailed Eagle.

Perhaps the most amazing sight were the large 'Chinese' Carp that kept leaping 'Salmon style' out of the water. Inevitable one landed on the rear of one of our boats and was quickly secured by the captain for his plate.

Gârla Perivolovca

This quiet secluded woody channel held a female Collared Flycatcher and then a Black Woodpecker popped out. There were just two Night Herons - presumably most had already left the delta. Other birds included a Pygmy Cormorant, White-tailed Eagle, white-headed form Long-tailed Tits and Great Reed Warbler. On a second visit we had fabulous views of a pair of Lesser Spotted Woodpecker, a dark morph juvenile Honey Buzzard circled incredibly low over, three Ferruginous Duck, Little Stint, Black Stork and some saw a skulking Thrush Nightingale.

Murighiol Salt-lake

As we docked at Murighiol there was a swarm of White Pelicans circling in the distance. A Syrian Woodpecker perched right by the bus. At the salt-lake were four Ferruginous Ducks, none of which showed the white vent, ten Black-winged Stilts and a flock of 50 Purple Heron headed south. Nearby two adult White-tailed Eagles perched on some pylons.

Sarinasuf fishpond

Two Cattle Egrets flew through and a Long-legged Buzzard perched low on a pylon. Nearby we saw three Cuckoos including a tame bird that was hunting for caterpillars in a garden.

Tulcea Marsh

This marshy area by the town was wonderful. Looking down on the action we saw as many as 150 Spoonbills, many Great Egrets, a handful of Pygmy Cormorants and two Syrian Woodpeckers.

Macin Mountains National Park

En route we spotted several Turtle Doves, a few Hawfinches and a very low Lesser Spotted Eagle. At the site there was a Red-rumped Swallow, Syrian Woodpecker, a juvenile Pallid Harrier and Long-legged Buzzard. There was a profusion of common butterflies as well as Eastern Green Lizard, Balkan Wall Lizard and a Wasp Spider.

Babadag Forest near Horia

The open woodland was leaping with Hawfinches, but virtually all were flying over. Three Sombre Tits popped out. There were many Cardinal fritillaries floating about and another Mediterranean Slant-faced Grasshopper - this time a green one.

Lake Hazarlâc

At last a Ferruginous Duck with a white vent. Also there were several Pygmy Cormorants, an inland Spotted Redshank and a couple of Ospreys, one of which caught a fish.

A huge thank you to our guide, Zoltan (Zoli) for all his incredible spotting and organisational abilities, and to our very reliable driver, Imre, who seemed to know instinctively when to stop and turn off the engine.

Recorded in good numbers throughout the week and seen or heard daily although most were in flight, calling as they went overhead. All calls were those we are familiar with in western Europe (so presumably given by Blue-headed (*flava*) or Grey-headed Wagtails (*thunbergi*). Of birds seen on the ground, the majority were first-winter birds, which were difficult to assign specific subspecies, but all of the adults we saw were nominate *flava* (Blue-headed Wagtail).
